

View from the Curate's House

As you will probably know Churches Together are heavily involved in the development of a foodbank for the Deepings area. Over the last year or so many of the clergy in the area and organisations such as the Citizens Advice Bureau had noticed an increase in the number of people experiencing financial difficulty, who were coming and asking for support. These people were struggling to keep a roof over their heads, and to pay the ever-increasing costs of heating and lighting etc. As a result they found themselves running out of money to pay for other necessities such as food. Information from the charity, Christians against Poverty, seems to support this analysis as their statistics reveal that the average credit card debt of people coming to them for support was £28,000. When Churches Together discussed the matter it decided that something had to be done to help those in need in our community and the idea of setting up a foodbank took shape.

The response of the churches, schools and organisations to the planned foodbank has been tremendous. Charitable grants, donations from churches and monetary gifts from individuals have flooded in and we hope to be opening the Deepings Foodbank at the Deepings School by the end of November.

One of the most encouraging aspects of our fundraising has been the support of our young people for this project. Without any prompting, two of our primary schools have donated their Harvest Celebration gifts to the Foodbank. I went to one school to receive their gifts and took a number of beautifully decorated boxes, filled with foodstuffs to our temporary food store (the Old Vicarage) only to be called to ask when I was going to take the rest of the donations. It turned out that the school had presented me with some token boxes in the service but they also had a classroom filled with bags and boxes of pasta, biscuits, cereal, tins etc. which the children had collected for the project. The following day another school phoned to say that it had another huge donation of food for the foodbank and this was gratefully received by one of the foodbank committee.

The generosity of people didn't stop there, as churches such as our own also gave the proceeds from their harvest lunches and auctions to the foodbank. Certain commercial organisations in the area have also expressed an interest in supporting the project. At the end of the month we will be working with Tesco's in Market Deeping who have offered to support us as part of a national 3 day event supporting foodbanks.

There is a lot of work still to do before the foodbank can be officially launched and become operational and if you would like to get involved please let me know. Please can I also ask you to support the project in your prayers, praying for a successful launch, for all those who have volunteered to help and most of all for all the families and individuals who find themselves in need of the service.

The cost of £2-00 will include Coffee and Mince Pies.



Tickets Adult £6 Child £4 include light refreshments and are available from 01778 346879 or 343860 or at the door.



Diocesan Synod Digest of the meeting held on Saturday 28 September 2013 at Chapter House, Lincoln Cathedral.

The Bishop of Lincoln's Presidential Address introduced the motion "That this Synod supports the vision and direction of the Diocese of Lincoln as Faithful, Confident, Joyful".

The Bishop's mission statement for the diocese is: "To respond to the love of God as faithful worshipping communities and as confident disciples of Jesus Christ, joyfully serving and witnessing to him in the world through the power of the Holy Spirit".

The motion was voted for unanimously.

Matters arising: There were no matters arising.

Air Vice-Marshal Canon Paul Robinson was welcomed by the Chair, the Revd Canon John Patrick, and reported that the Central Services Review had been conducted as agreed by Synod in October 2012, and had made some radical proposals.



"John's Journey"

Born under the shadow of the Priory Church Spire at 10, Eastgate, I was the third child of Reg and Freda Fisher. I have two brothers, Ray and Tony, and a sister, Josie.


Having lived in Deeping all my life, I was educated at the Infant School (now home to the Clubs and Scouts), the Cross School (now the Youth Club) and finally the Deepings School where I was one of its first pupils. My Mum encouraged me to attend Sunday School under the teaching of Miss Crowson. One of the highlights was the annual outing to the seaside. One evening I was 'press-ganged' into joining the church choir by one of my friends. This was short-lived because I lacked musical orientation.

After leaving school I served an engineering apprenticeship at Baker Perkins, leaving in 1979 to work in the family motor car business. Unfortunately I had to retire prematurely in 1999 due to the onset of motor neurone disease. My disability curtailed my participation in field sports and country and coastal walking. I still enjoy getting out into the countryside on my mobility scooter with my dogs. Married to Rosemary, we have two daughters, Louise and Suzanne, both of whom were taught at Sunday School by Miss Crowson.

My wife and I used to own a touring caravan and on one of our many holidays visited Wells Cathedral. Whilst inside the cathedral I had the sensation of someone touching me which I believe guided me on a renewed spiritual journey. Following the death of my mother in 1992 I decided to attend confirmation classes and was confirmed in the autumn of that year.

I thoroughly enjoy the fellowship of the church and the Wednesday evening housegroup. My faith has given me strength to cope with my illness. If I was asked what my favourite hymn and Psalm are, I would say Hymn 170, 'The Church's One Foundation', and Psalm 119.

Getting to Know You...

Jill Ironside tells us about herself and her family and also answers all the questions I should have asked her before letting her into the Choir! (Actually, it's great to have you singing with us, Jill!)

Hello all,

My name is Jill Ironside and most Sundays I can be found in the front row of the choir with the sopranos. (I am the one that can't sing, but don't tell John!) I grew up in Lichfield, worshipping at St Chad's Church with my parents, and attending the church run youth group and discussion group. I remember many happy weekends staying at Dovedale House in Illam, Derbyshire (owned by the Dioceses of Lichfield and used as a youth residential

centre) with youth group and going away as a family on our parish camping weekends. I certainly remember attending Sunday School and working my way through the Scramblers, Climbers and Explorers materials, and I even taught at Sunday School while I was in my 6th form. I left home after my A levels to attend Bishop Grosseteste College, the Church of England Teacher Training college in Lincoln, and it's there that I met my husband, Phillip, who was a student at Lincoln Technical College.

Phillip and I bought our first house in Lincoln (back in the days when 22 year olds could afford to buy houses!) and both found jobs in



the city, Phillip as an Engineer and myself as a Civil Servant (the teaching bit didn't quite work out as expected!). We got married in 1989, and had six lovely years of peace and quiet before the children came along. Joe was born 1995, Eleanor in 1997, Bea in 1999 and Hattie in 2003. I gave up work to stay at home with them while they were small, and loved being able to go to toddler groups and do lots of socialising with friends.

Phillip changed jobs in 2000, to work at Perkins in Peterborough, and we finally moved to Deeping St James in 2001. However, we moved again within the year to Peoria, Illinois, USA, with his job, and it was here that Hattie was born. We had an amazing 5 years living in the States, and managed to tour as much as was possible with 3 young children and a brand new baby. Sadly, Perkins recalled us back to Deeping, and we moved back into our house in the village in 2006. Since then, Phillip has changed jobs several times, but we have managed to stay put and not had to relocate again. We are now at the stage where we are

about to extend our house to fit in our ever growing family. Teenagers seem to take up so much room!

I now work full time as a Teaching Assistant in the Reception class at Deeping St James Community Primary School, and I am really lucky to absolutely love my job. Last year I made the momentous decision to complete my degree via Open University, and I have now just started the final module of my honours degree. It can be a bit tricky managing to work and study and run a house ... but my children are getting better at cooking and using the washing machine! I hope that this time next year I will begin my training to become a teacher - completing what I first started in 1984.

As a family we all enjoy sailing and have 3 boats at Rutland Sailing Club. Unfortunately, club racing is on a Sunday morning, and so I usually only manage to get out on the water in the summer holidays when the choir are taking their well deserved summer break. We camped lots while the children were small, but teenage girls seem highly resistant to the idea of roughing it in a tent! Left to myself, I enjoy reading and am always to be found with a book in my hand. I love cooking too, and like pottering in the kitchen, baking cakes and scones (I dream of being a size 12, but somehow always manage to find room for the last piece of flapjack, or fruit crumble, so think it's highly unlikely I will ever get there!)

Cooking with Margaret: Apple Cake



Ingredients:

225g Cooking Apples, peeled, cored and chopped,

225g Sultanas

150ml Milk

175g Soft brown sugar

350g S R Flour

2 level tsp mixed spice

175g Butter, softened

1 Egg, beaten

25g Demerara Sugar

Method:

Mix together the apples, sultanas, milk, and sugar

Sieve flour and spices together and rub in the butter

Add the fruit mixture and egg and mix well

Place in a lined 20cm square cake tin

Sprinkle with Demerara sugar and bake in the oven at 170°C/325°F/Gas 3 for 1¼ hours until risen and golden brown

He went on to say that this is an organic process and will continue as the Diocese grows and develops. Canon Robinson highlighted the importance of communication. The reports are available on the website: dioce.se/csrimp

A presentation was given by the Venerable Jane Sinclair entitled '**Shaping the Future**'. This expanded on the areas highlighted in the Central Services Review and how this could be used to drive forward the Diocese for the future. The Archdeacon did not go through the Report in detail, but picked out some of the key elements and how they might shape the Diocese. The Archdeacon highlighted:

Mission Communities - these will be fundamental to our planning and engagement in sharing the Gospel over the coming years.

Worship - is at the heart of everything we do. Archdeacon Justine Allain Chapman will be developing this aspect of our life together through her **discipleship** work.

Education and training - regular development reviews will identify training needs for clergy, and churchwardens and PCC members will be given training to equip them for the roles and responsibilities.

Church buildings - Mission Communities will be invited to look at their church buildings and to categorise them according to their use, enabling to use them better and help resource our mission.

Clergy numbers - it is clear that we need to recruit and retain a significantly increased number of high-quality clergy.

Readers and ALMs - are invited to feed back with what resourcing and support would best assist their ministry.

Financial support - parish share is not an end in itself, it's a collaborative exercise in generosity, and we need to consider how parish officers can help people in their parish to become better stewards of the money that is entrusted to them by God. The current parish share system will be amended, and the Mission Community will be the basic unit for the calculation.

Mission Fund - this is a financial resource, largely for special mission projects. Collaboration and community are at the heart of the Mission Fund approach, and all are encouraged to think creatively on how to use the funds available. The Archdeacon's presentation can be viewed here: dioce.se/synodjane

Each representative was invited to complete a feedback card. The comments will be considered by Bishop's staff.

The Chair of the House of Laity put the motion that "This Synod agrees to waive Standing Order 72 until the next meeting of this Diocesan Synod, to allow for the creation of a separate Bishop's Council and Diocesan Mission and Pastoral Committee. The current Diocesan Council, and on its inception the Bishop's Council, will be for the time being the Standing Committee of this Synod". The motion was carried unanimously.

The Synod closed with worship.

The next meeting of Diocesan Synod will be on 9 November 2013 at Bishop Grosseteste University College, Lincoln, beginning at 6.30pm.
